





hen Anna Meadows and her husband, Alistair, bought a duplex in Sydney's eastern suburbs, they knew it needed a major overhaul. The 1940s brick building had only had one previous remodel, in the 1980s, and the couple wanted the two separate dwellings to be merged into one large home for them and their three children: Sophie, six, William, five, and baby Tom.

Anna was set on having the living areas oriented towards the backyard and she wanted the new structure to have a distinctive look and sharp detailing. She also wanted an interior designer with enough pizzazz to pull it all together, and so called on Greg Natale, of Greg Natale Design, who jumped at the opportunity to take an architectural approach to a home renovation. Six careful months of planning followed. Then, after the building work began, the family lived in the upstairs section while the ground floor was renovated.


"The building work took six months and it was a godsend to always have had a shower, running water and a working kitchen during that time," Anna says. When the downstairs was complete, builders from Ciolino Constructions removed the upstairs kitchen to make way for a staircase. With the work finished, the house now has a spacious family, kitchen and dining area

Greg delights in designing interiors that are highly decorative, but in this house, he has let the detailing, colours and materials do the talking.

◀ (which opens out onto an entertaining deck and pool), a media room, guestroom and combined bathroom and laundry on the ground floor. Upstairs are four bedrooms and a generous play room where the children can have free rein.

The key to Greg's design is the arresting staircase that is positioned in the middle of the house. As well as drawing the eye upwards, the dark timber treads and striking stainless-steel balustrade tie the two floors together and add an architectural flourish to the space. "The strength of the staircase meant

that the rest of the house didn't need a lot of embellished furnishings," Greg says.

The colours and materials do most of the talking and this was quite a stylistic departure for Greg, who has a reputation for designing interiors with richly decorative touches which include the bold use of wallpaper.

But in this house, Anna wanted a more restrained palette, so Greg presented her with a trio of colours that had the succulent green of Dulux's Cucumber Crush as its hero - and Anna loved it.

The walls are the perfect backdrop to the furniture Greg has selected. Pieces such as the Knoll Tulip dining table and Panton chairs may be iconic designs, but they're also durable ▶


## **DESIGNING MINDS**

"We wanted the renovations to be as harmonious with the original house as possible. With this in mind, we kept the design very minimal and used honest materials like steel, timber and glass," says interior designer Greg Natale. "A wall of sliding glass doors not only connects the family area and deck but also allows natural light to penetrate deep into the house. The kitchen bench pierces through the sliding glass doors onto the deck where it becomes the barbecue bench, creating a seamless finish."



◀ and easy to keep clean, which makes them ideal for family living. Other mid-20th century design classics, such as an Arco lamp, are also dotted around the home.

When it came to choosing the finishes and fittings for the kitchen, Greg and his team looked beyond the decorative to the practical – a laminate veneer called Oberflex. It's a veneer with a melamine resin hot-pressed on top, which means it can be used on kitchen cabinetry with no fear of water damage. CaesarStone was used for the benchtop, and it appears to flow continuously outside, onto the deck.

Greg chose translucent glass for the splashback – selected in response to Anna's request that the kitchen be "light and bright". The splashback, which runs the length of the kitchen work bench, brings a subtle softness to the otherwise sharp lines of the kitchen.

Anna says that the inside-outside crossover zone is her favourite part of the house. "I love the way the kitchen bench flows through the sliding doors to become a barbecue bench," she says. "It's a sleek and seamless design." A perfect reflection of the home in which it sits.

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
