













his family of five had lived on a generous block on a gently sloping site in Sydney's eastern suburbs for some years before deciding to transform it. Originally engaging architect Bernard Teh Howell to design the home, a DA was secured before Bernard suddenly and sadly passed away. Having a fair idea of what they desired, the clients were introduced to designer Greg Natale through the builder, and invited him on board.

With a teenage son and two younger daughters, the family was looking for a home that catered for the needs of children developing their own social lives, as well as the collective propensity to entertain with extended family and friends. "They were after something classic, with proportions and spaces that gave them room to grow as a family," Greg says.

Working with the owners, the team extensively reworked sections of the house to respond to the brief. A basement was introduced to house a suite of entertainment elements, such as a cellar, home cinema and guest accommodation. A pitched roof in the original design was rethought, streamlining the facade to accentuate the subtle Art Deco character.

Other design features were integrated to bring warmth and personality into what would be a large home. A sinuous, ribbon-like circular staircase connects the three floors, a bold structural statement whose curves are echoed in partitions and ceiling details on the ground floor. Generous proportions provided the opportunity for wide hallways that feel almost gallery-like with the art purchased from South Africa and elsewhere.

Greg's impressive residential portfolio often features strong patterns, however in this project it was to be pared back. "While they liked pattern and were keen for texture and layers the scheme also had to be understated," he says. "White was a key part of our brief and from the exterior to the interiors it enhances the crisp detailing."

Greg's solution was to break up the interior expanses of white with grey and blue, and to include a statement front door. "The brilliant blue front door is probably the only really loud design statement in the home," he says. "The other introductions of colour and pattern are more delicately handled. I felt that the front door, against all that white, could afford to be bold – creating a real sense of arrival." The blue is carried through into the elegant entrance hall with hints of blue in the custom rug and, sparingly, in furniture, finishes, objects and art.

As with most of Greg's projects, custom joinery brings an extra level of care and consideration to the aesthetic, creating a feeling of cohesiveness. Signature joinery details, as well as metalwork in balustrades echo the Art Deco curves, which soften the grand scale of the individual spaces.

Overall the home is built for entertaining. The pool and outdoor area are well used in the warmer months with the kitchen placed adjacent to provide easy access. Similarly, the basement entertaining level opens directly out to the backyard and pool area, perfect for the younger members of the family.

Not just a beautiful home for the clients, this project is an evolution of Greg's work. While all projects pose their unique challenges, the brief here for a more classic and restrained design meant tweaking some of his signature elements. "I see this as a softer, more classically inspired Greg Natale project," he says. "There is definitely an evolution towards smooth lines, more organic curves and softer schemes." Yet this pared-back home beautifully celebrates the layering, detail, texture and pattern that are characteristic of the practice. 18
